

OYAP – Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program

Students interested in Apprenticeship Training in their 2nd semester of their grade 12 year in Automotive Service, Culinary Arts, Hairstyling, Plumbing, Electrician, Residential Heating and Air Conditioning, Child Development, Construction, General Carpentry and Floor Covering Installation should speak to the co-op teacher to learn more about Open House dates and deadlines to apply.



SEE U of T Program:

The new SEE U of T pilot project is an access program and collaboration between the University of Toronto in the Toronto District School Board. The aim of the program is to encourage students who come from communities historically underrepresented at U of T and post-secondary institutions to view post-secondary education as a viable destination. Students involved are taking a first year university course and participating in a co-op placement on campus; students travel to U of T campus every afternoon.

SEE U of T co-op placements include: working at Hart House, the Faculty of Dentistry, Pharmacy and Medicine, the Department of Psychology, Physics, Math, Chemistry, Linguistics, Rotman Commerce, the John H. Daniels Faculty of Architecture, Landscape and Design and Innis College. Students have had exciting opportunities such as being trained to use EEG technology, assist with lab research, attend interesting colloquiums, sit in on a first year lecture courses and participate in research projects.

In addition to their co-op roles, students have been exposed to many areas of the university and have been able to interview undergraduate and PhD students, doctors, and U of T staff to enhance their understanding of admission requirements, opportunities on campus and what to expect when they attend post-secondary. The SEE U of T Program has allowed students to become more familiar with campus life, the academic supports available and workload expectations once they enter post-secondary studies.

Dual Credit Program

The Dual Credit Program is a program that allows grade 11 and 12 students to take a course at a college that count towards both college and non-compulsory secondary credits at the same time. There are more than 30 courses offered at George Brown, Humber and Seneca. Students attend college once a week, there is no tuition cost for this program and books and transportation are included also. If you are interested in learning more about the Dual Credit Program, speak to the Guidance or Co-op Education Departments.
