8. Ward 7 Update	Michelle Haurilak via email)	• Update	 This is the high level summary and minutes are available on the Ward 7 website. Right to Read presentation: "Learning to Read is not a privilege, but a basic and essential human right. Early reading instruction is a social justice issue and the OHRC launched a public inquiry into human rights issues facing students with reading disabilities in Ontario's public education system. The report has detailed findings and recommendations for many stakeholders including the Ministry of Education, school boards, and faculties of education." LOTS of passion and emotion from parents on this topic, particularly around the subject of dyslexia, as well as acknowledgement that most families cannot afford to send their children to private tutoring to help them learn to read. Waiting for the Ministry of Education to make changes before the school boards can implement. Budget process overview: Robin gave an overview of the budgeting process, and let us know that reduced enrolment (partly due to families leaving the city during the pandemic) is impacting funding for schools. The situation is not good for many schools with low enrolment. We reviewed a map of proposed changes to schools in east Ward 7 (based on enrolment)
